How to make a finger puppet hedgehog

You will need: cardboard roll, thin card (from a cereal box or similar), scissors, pencil, fine nib permanent marker (black), paint, paintbrush, glue stick.

Instructions:

- 1. Gently push downwards and inwards one end of the cardboard roll.
- 2. Place the cardboard roll on the thin card. Draw the prickles or spines (using a zig-zag or jagged line) around the cardboard roll. Cut out.
- 3. Draw two small circles (for eyes) on the thin card and cut out.
- 4. Paint the cardboard roll (body of the hedgehog) one colour and the prickles another. If you wish to use two browns, like the example below, you can make a darker brown by adding a little black paint (as we've done) or a lighter colour by adding a little white paint. Leave to dry.
- 5. Using a fine nib permanent marker, add a pupil to each eye. Use glue to secure the eyes to the body of the hedgehog (cardboard roll). Draw on the snout and mouth using the permanent marker.
- 6. Put a generous amount of glue down the centre of the prickles. Secure the body of the hedgehog to the prickles. Leave to dry.
- 7. Your hedgehog is now ready to explore the hedgerows! To use as a puppet, insert several fingers into the base of the cardboard roll.

Fun facts: the Museum has a hedgehog on display in the library. Hedgehogs have poor eyesight but a great sense of smell. They are good runners, proficient climbers and can even swim. If attacked, they will roll into a tight ball so their prickles (spines) are exposed. They hibernate (go to sleep) during the winter months.
