
Make the snail and the whale

We were inspired by the charming story, The Snail and The Whale, by Julia Donaldson.

You will need: a large paper plate (or thin card from a cereal box or similar and a dinner plate). pencil, scissors, paint, paintbrush, pieces of scrap (thin) card, egg box carton, felt tip pens (black and brown), glue stick, sticky tape, stapler (optional).

Instructions:

- 1. Fold the paper plate in half. If you don't have a paper plate, use a large piece of thin card (from a cereal box or similar) and a dinner plate. Draw around the plate, cut out the circle and fold in half.
- 2. Fold in the front of the plate, which will form the face of the whale, and draw the shape as shown on the picture below (left). Cut out the shape.



- 3. Do not discard the shape you have cut out. Draw a tail fin shape on this (see picture above, middle) and cut out. With the remaining card, make a side fin also. You many need to trim.
- 4. With the black felt tip pen, draw details onto the whale, and then paint the whale, the side and tail fins. Leave to dry.
- 5. Cut one section of the egg box carton (snail's shell). Draw and cut out a small tongueshape (snail's body) from a scrap of thin card, along with two antennae. Paint and leave to dry.
- 6. Draw two very small circles and one large circle on a scrap of thin card. These will be the eyes of your snail and whale respectively. Cut out. With a felt tip pen, add a pupil to each.
- 7. Cut out a mouth shape on your whale. Glue on the whale's eye, side fin and tail fin you can also use sticky tape or a stapler. Leave to dry, if using glue.
- 8. Glue the eyes and antennae onto the snail's body. Attach the body to the snail's shell with sticky tape. With a felt tip, add details to the snail (see picture above, right). Leave to dry.
- 9. Your snail and whale are complete! You can use them to act out the story.



Fun facts: the story tells of a tiny snail hitching a ride, and having an amazing adventure, on the tail of an enormous humpback whale.

We have some snail shells in the museum collection, including a 'copse snail' shell. This is a medium-sized land snail. Their shell is mottled brown and their body dark brown. While most UK snails live 1-2 years, it is thought that this snail lives up to 17!
